

## Awesome Arrows Supports children with these challenges:

#### Academic Link

- encourages tracking from left to right
- encourages crossing the midline of the body

#### Poster Instructions









Arms come across the body and both hands point right, left, up, or down, following the direction of the arrows


On the down arrow, students tend to bend their knees, which is fine.

For added challenge, children can touch the ground on the down arrow and reach up on tip toes for the up arrows.



In between each arm movement, students clap by bringing both hands back to the center of their bodies. The clap is very important for maintaining

In rows two through four, students move their feet along with their arms in the direction of the arrow. Feet come back together after each arrow while clapping. If adding feet is too difficult, just do the arm movements.




For added difficulty, students can jump once in place with both feet while clapping.


After children are able to perform the movements smoothly and rhythmically, they should begin to say the words aloud with each clap or arrow movement, depending on where the words are written on the posters.


